Andrew Serdy lectures in Public International Law and the International Law of the Sea at the School of Law, University of Southampton. Since 2004 he has also been a Visiting Fellow in the Faculty of Law at the University of Wollongong (NSW). Before his appointment to the University of Southampton in 2005, Mr Serdy was first briefly an employed solicitor with Freehill, Hollingdale & Page in Sydney and then worked for many years in the Australian Government Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. There he first served in a number of diplomatic positions (including postings in Tokyo and Warsaw), before specialising from 1996 in the law of the sea in the Department's Sea Law, Environmental Law and Antarctic Policy Section, from 2002 as Executive Officer (i.e. deputy director). In this capacity he drafted significant parts of Australia's 2004 submission under the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) to the Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf on the outer limits of Australia's shelf where it extends beyond 200 miles from the territorial sea baseline, as well as being a member of the team that formally presented the submission to the Commission, and interacted with the subcommission established to examine it, at its 15th session in New York in 2005. Earlier, Mr Serdy appeared for Australia in 2000 in the Southern Bluefin Tuna case – the first ever to come before an UNCLOS Annex VII tribunal. He is a member of the Board of Editors of Ocean Development and International Law.
