







The Spratly Islands: What and Where?

- What? Profusion of submerged banks and shoals, reefs, cays and low-tide elevations, rocks and islets
- Where? Scattered over c.240,000km² of the southern South China Sea
- How many? Estimates vary.
 - Only 36 above water at high tide
- How big?
 - Largest (Itu Aba): 1.4km long, area of c.50 hectares
 - Spratly Island: c.13 hectares in area
 - Total surface area estimated at 8km²

Unilateral claims (Philippines' KIG polygon)


Unilateral claims (Malaysia Peta Baru 1979)




South China Sea

 - Environmental/Food security






The "oil rich" Spratlys?


- Persistent perception that the seabed around the Spratlys hosts significant oil and gas resources
 - The "next Middle East"?
- Wild variation in estimated reserves
 - USGS: 21,500Mb
 - Chinese estimates: 105,000-213,000Mb
- Speculative estimates due to lack of exploration
- Resources vs Reserves
- Seabed hydrocarbons present but at the margins?
- Predominantly gas prone
- Significant lead time
- No 'silver bullet' for regional energy security concerns

- Fisheries incidents with Indonesia, 2009 & 2010
- Cable cutting incidents with Vietnam, 2011 & 2012
- Incident off Malaysia 2012
- Reed Bank incidents, 2011
- Scarborough Shoal standoff, 2012
- CNOOC blocks, June 2012



Prospects

- Increasing clarity or complexity?
- Increasing activity, increasing militarisation
- More incidents highly likely
- Efforts to defuse tensions/clarify claims
 - Code of conduct?
 - Joint development?
 - Arbitration?
